Common names are often regional in nature, with the same plant being called different names in different places. To avoid confusion it is best to identify a plant by its species name. Species names are a binomial composed of two parts, with genus being the first component. The genus and specific epithet together is the species. For example Acer is the genus and Acer rubrum is the species name for Red Maple. Sugar Maple, Silver Maple, Boxelder and Red Maple all belong in the Genus Acer. If you do a search using the common name verify with the species name that it is the same plant.


